## FBLA

Mission: Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) focuses on business competitions, community service activities, and development of leadership skills.

Purpose: This club promotes success in business through leadership skills development and business competitions throughout the school year.

Meetings: 1 per month (first Wednesday of each month)
Events: NHS FBLA participates in the PA FBLA State Leadership Workshop, the Region 2 Leadership Conference, the PA FBLA State Leadership Conference and, if successful, the FBLA National Leadership Conference.

Travel: FBLA travels to the State Leadership Workshop in the Poconos (limited number of spaces) for two nights, the Regional Leadership Conference (day trip only), and the State Leadership Conference in Hershey (qualifiers only) for three nights.

Cost: Students are required to pay National, State, and Local dues along with the cost to participate in the Regional Leadership Conference. The dues for 2023-2024 are \$40. In addition, students who qualify for the State Conference are expected to pay a portion of the travel expenses.

Eligible Participants: Grades 9-12


## FORENSICS

Mission: The Neshannock Forensics Club connects, supports, and inspires a diverse community committed to empowering students through speech and debate.

Purpose: Forensics Club allows students to develop research, argumentation, speechwriting, oratory and performance skills needed in the lawyers, educators, politicians and performers of the future! Mission: To serve as advocates to the junior high student body and be liaisons between them, the administration, faculty, and staff

Purpose: To give students an opportunity to develop leadership by organizing and carrying out school activities and service projects. In addition to planning events that contribute to school spirit and community welfare, the student council is the voice of the student body.

## Meetings: 1 per month

Events: Both officers and members are expected to help plan, carry out, and attend Junior High Student Council events, including, but not limited to, the winter semi-formal, and fundraisers.

Prerequisites: In order to participate as a member of Junior High Student Council, students must submit an application. Representatives are then determined by a vote among their peers. Applications are typically emailed to the student body the first week of school. Students must be active members of "student life" at Neshannock Junior High School, demonstrate good character both inside and outside of school, attend all meetings (in person), and participate in student councilsponsored events.

Travel: Annual Competition at Westminster College (day trip)
Cost: $\$ 25.00$
Eligible Participants: Grades 9-12

Mission: To acknowledge good grades, leadership, service, and character and use those pillars to benefit the school and local community

Purpose: This club exists to develop leadership and character skills while instilling a sense of community service to others.

Meetings: 1 per month and then as needed for special events
Events: Annual Veterans Day Recognition program, annual Thanksgiving Food Drive, Socktober Sock Drive, United Way Blanket Drive, Christmas Hygiene collection for Nursing homes, Holiday cards for military and nursing homes - Christmas and Valentines day, and Trunk or treat at various locations. Peer tutoring is a requirement.

Travel: Annual Competition at Westminster College (day trip)
Cost: $\$ 17$ (annual dues)
Prerequisites: Grades must be $92.5 \%$ by end of term 3 sophomore year and then follow the application process. Students must be committed to peer tutoring and monthly community service projects.

Meetings: 1 per week
Travel: The TSA Regional Conference is typically held on a Saturday (day trip). Qualifying students may go to the 3-day/2-night State Conference.

Cost: $\$ 25.00$ Dues; If a student qualifies for travel to the state competition, travel expenses are paid for by the student, with some costs being offset by fundraising.

Eligible Participants: Grades 7-12

## VIDEO GAME CLUB

## Faculty Supervisor: Mr. Christopher Ferry

Mission: The Video Game Club is primarily focused on playing video games. Club members will have the opportunity to bring in their consoles in order to engage in multi-player or single player video games.

Purpose: This club exists to give students who are interested in video games a safe and fun environment to come together to play individually, in group settings, and discuss video games.

Meetings: The amount of times the club meets per month will be based on the number of participants. If there are 15 or fewer participants, the club will meet as a whole twice per month. If there are between 16 and 30 participants, the club will be divided into two sections, by grade level bands, with each section meeting once per month.

Maximum Participants: $15-30$
Prerequisites: Club members must be in good academic and behavioral standing. The club advisor will contact building principals before adding the students to the active club list.

Additional Information: The video games played in this club will be school appropriate. All games must be rated E for Everyone or T for Teens as long as the content is approved by the Video Game Club Advisor. Games with realistic weapons, excessive violence/crime glorification, or profanity will not be permitted. Students may bring in any console so long as they have permission from their parents/guardians and it can be hooked up to a TV/Monitor.

## YEARBOOK

Mission: This unofficial club takes photos and writes up details of events to be included in the yearbook.

Purpose: To support the yearbook staff in covering school events.
Meetings: As needed per scheduling of events
Travel: Voluntary travel to photograph events at the school, Pearson Park, or golf course after school hours to cover events. Students are responsible for their own transportation and associated expenses.

Additional Information: This is an unofficial club made up of students who would like to help the yearbook staff with event coverage even though they may not have yearbook in their class schedule.
